

Project Overview:

- Executed Q2 Security Blitz, a grassroots outreach effort where DART employees went out to rail stations and transit centers to personally tell customers about the new DART Say Something security app.
- Designed to increase awareness and downloads for the DART Say Something app.
- Event volunteers held signs and wore large lanyards, while passing out wallet-sized cards promoting the new mobile app.
- DART Police Chief James Spiller and his deputy chiefs were available at West End Station for media interviews.
- Locations: 52 DART stations and facilities systemwide.

Highlights:

- Increased overall downloads by 24 percent, from 5,502 to 6,812.
- DART executive management team led the way recruiting and volunteering with their teams.
- Volunteers staffed 52 DART stations and facilities that were grouped in 20 different zones.
 - 26 front line staff, including concierges and travel ambassadors, served as captains.

By the Numbers:

- There were 1,310 Say Something app downloads in just one day average was 140 downloads per week at time of launch.
- The one-day blitz generated more than 100 million positive earned media impressions.
- Nearly 200 DART employees volunteered for the March 7 Security Blitz.
- 1,317 units of signage included bus interiors, infotainment bus monitors, rail interiors, corner markers and windscreens.
 - 15.4 million impressions
 - Market value: \$451,744
- Eight Facebook posts reached 6,400 people and generated nearly 9,000 impressions.
- Nine tweets on Twitter produced 18,119 impressions.
- One Instagram post reached 612 people and garnered 715 impressions.
- Three DART Daily blog articles were viewed 116 times.
- One issue of the Insights security and safety newsletter shared highlights of the event with the DART Board.

Ramone Roberson, who was catching a train into downtown Dallas, said he appreciated DART sending staff out to let riders know about the app and would download it.
