#### PSTA is Your Official Ride to St. Pete Pride

St. Petersburg, Fla. – The Pinellas Suncoast Transit Authority (PSTA) is proud to be the Official Transportation Provider of Florida's largest LGBT Pride event – St. Pete Pride.

As hundreds of thousands of locals and tourists flood to St. Petersburg's waterfront for the weekend, PSTA is gearing up to handle the masses.

Eventgoers will have the option of parking at a free Park-N-Ride on Saturday, June 24, courtesy of PSTA. The Park-N-Ride will operate service from noon to midnight between the parking lot located at St. Petersburg High, 2501 Fifth Ave. N, and the downtown waterfront.

Riders boarding at any stop along PSTA's Route 5 between the Park-N-Ride pick-up and dropoff locations will also ride free.

This year, Pride attendees will also have the option of riding PSTA's Central Avenue Trolley (CAT) into the early morning hours. The CAT will be extending its hours until 2:30 a.m. to accommodate for late-night festivities throughout downtown. Riders can buy a single-use ticket onboard the CAT for \$2.25 or an all-night pass for \$5.

PSTA's fully-wrapped Pride bus, which will be making its debut at the parade Saturday night, will double as a cooling station at the St. Pete Pride Festival on Sunday, June 25.

### Everything you need to know to party at St. Pete Pride

Now in its 15th year, the St. Pete Pride celebration will draw 200,000 people to a new parade route Saturday along downtown's scenic waterfront. It has grown into the largest gay pride parade in the Southeast and keeps evolving.

For the first time, this year's parade will kick off with a TransPride March consisting of transgender and gendernonconforming communities and their supporters. They will gather at 6 p.m. at Albert Whitted Park and march north along Bayshore and meet up with the St. Pete Pride Parade starting point.

The parade is surpassing its own records this year with 40 floats and more than 100 contingents, stepping off at North Straub Park on Bayshore Drive at 7 p.m., followed by fireworks at 9:45 p.m.

"I think overall it will seem a little different this year," said Eric Skains, executive director of St. Pete Pride. "It makes it easier for people within walking distance of hotels and there's a much larger number of restaurants and bars participating and holding events that will really help people stay in St. Petersburg after the event."

It was in June of 1969 that the gay community stood up to a police raid on the Stonewall Inn in New York's Greenwich Village neighborhood. The series of sometimes violent demonstrations is considered a turning point in the gay rights movement and has turned June into Gay Pride Month around the country.

The St. Petersburg event has swelled into more than a full week of activities and parties that organizers said has developed to have an economic impact of more \$20 million. And not without some growing pains.

Moving the parade with thousands of revelers from the gay-friendly Grand Central District along Central Avenue to the scenic waterfront brought a showdown with City Hall. In the end, organizers won the right to move the parade downtown, but kept Sunday's street festival in Grand Central.

Past mayors have refused to attend one of the city's largest events, making it a political hot button. Being an election year, current mayor Rick Kriseman is touting his embrace of Pride. In 2012, he was the first mayor to be one of the parade's grand marshals. His opponent, former mayor Rick Baker, never attended the parade while in office but has said it is important to embrace the LGBT community.

#### The weekend

A free concert from 7-10 p.m. on Friday in Straub Park will be a fundraiser for local nonprofits. On Saturday, there will be continuous music in Straub Park and vendors starting at 2 p.m. The parade will start at Fifth Avenue NE at North Straub Park at 7 p.m. and run about a mile south on Bayshore Drive to Albert Whitted Park along the downtown waterfront, followed by fireworks. Sunday's street festival from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. on Central Avenue at 25th Street will have more than 350 vendors, multiple stages, live music, art and food.

#### Getting there

There will be a free park and ride at St. Petersburg High School, 2501 Fifth Ave. N, from noon to midnight on Saturday. And the Central Avenue Trolley will run until 2:30 a.m. PSTA also has several routes serving the area if you want to park remotely. See psta.net for maps and schedules or call the InfoLine at (727) 540-1900.

#### The parade

This is the parade's fourth year as a nighttime spectacle with 40 decorated floats and nearly 150 marching contingents, among them PSTA making its first appearance in a full-sized bus covered in lights. The parade comes with a dazzling array of sequins, beads, dancing, music, glitter and rainbows. Be on the lookout for popular favorites like the ROTC (Righteously Outrageous Twirling Corps).

#### Grand marshals

The parade has four grand marshals, female impersonator Kori Stevens; the Rev. Candace R. Shultis of King of Peace Metropolitan Community Church; Largo city commissioner Michael Smith; and activist Ed Lally of Equality Florida. There's also an organizational grand marshal this year in Project No Labels, a relatively new organization in the Tampa Bay LGBT

### 2017 St. Pete Pride: Parking and road closure info

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (WFLA) — More than 250,000 people are expected to head to St. Petersburg this weekend for St. Pete Pride events, which could make it a bit of a challenge when it comes to parking and getting around. More than 200,000 people are expected to attend the 15th annual St. Pete Pride Parade, which will be held in downtown St. Petersburg on Saturday, June 24.

An estimated 50,000 people are expected to attend the St. Pete Pride Festival which will be held on Sunday, June 25.

Here's what you need to know

#### Saturday

St. Pete Pride Party, North Straub Park (2-10 p.m.)

- This event is free.
- There will be restricted access on 5th Avenue North, from Bayshore Drive to Vinoy Place condos.
- At 5:45 p.m. Bayshore Drive will be closed between 5th Avenue North and Albert Whitted Park. Transgender March (6 p.m.)
- Begins at Albert Whitted Park and continues north on Bayshore Drive to 5th Avenue North.
   Pride Parade (7-10 p.m., look for the News Channel 8 crew!)
- Parade begins along Bayshore Drive and continues from 5th Avenue North to Albert Whitted Park.

St. Pete Pride Festival (9 a.m. - 4 p.m.)

### Pride Weekend: What about parking downtown?

There are about 23,000 available parking spaces downtown, and as you can imagine arriving early is the key.


You can also park at St. Petersburg High School, 5th Avenue North at 25th St N and use the free PSTA Shuttle to the event downtown.

Road closures begin at 2 pm along 5th Avenue North from Beach Drive into Northshore Park. The parade route closes to traffic at 5:45 with the parade beginning at 6:30pm.

On Sunday, the Pride Festival begins at 9 a.m. along Central Avenue between 31st St N and 22nd St N. Road closures begin at 5 a.m., the festival ends at 4 p.m. Central Ave will open to traffic as soon as the festival is clear.

Parking in the Kenwood Neighborhood is limited. Do not block any drives, and park in legal spaces only. PSTA will operate along 1st Ave N and 1st Ave S throughout the day for better access to the Pride Festival.
